Re: 1557 RFI (RIN 0945–AA02) Request for Information: Opioid Analgesic Prescriber Education and Training Opportunities to Prevent Opioid Overdose and Opioid Use Disorder

Dear Acting Assistant Secretary Martin:

On behalf of the American Nurses Association (ANA), we are pleased to respond to the Request for Information: Opioid Analgesic Prescriber Education and Training Opportunities to Prevent Opioid Overdose and Opioid Use Disorder. As the only full-service professional organization representing the interests of the nation's 3.6 million registered nurses (RNs), ANA is privileged to speak on behalf of its state and constituent member associations, organizational affiliates, and individual members. RNs serve in multiple direct care, care coordination, and administrative leadership roles, across the full spectrum of health care settings. RNs provide and coordinate patient care, educate patients and the public about various health conditions including essential self-care, and provide advice and emotional support to patients and their family members. ANA members also include the four advanced practice registered nurse roles: nurse practitioners, clinical nurse specialists, certified nurse-midwives and certified registered nurse anesthetists. ANA is dedicated to partnering with health care consumers to improve practices, policies, delivery models, outcomes, and access across the health care continuum.

We want to bring to your attention an important educational initiative. To combat the nation's opioid epidemic, 25 national nursing organizations have joined forces to offer a free online educational series that will serve as a resource for practicing nurses, faculty, and students. The series, entitled <u>Addressing the Opioid Crisis: The Nursing Education Series on Opioids</u>, offer nurses the opportunity to earn free continuing education credit – generally an effective mechanism to generate interest and engagement in learning and educational tools. The webinars will take place
